Transgender and Gender Non-Conforming Adolescents and Emerging Adults: Best Practices for Psychiatrists and Mental Health Clinicians, Educators, and Parents



In San Francisco, ASAP eagerly presents a very timely conference developed in response to the high volume of queries from clinicians and health care staff seeking to learn about providing high-quality care for adolescents and emerging adults who are questioning their gender identity or who identify as transgender or gender non-binary. This meeting is designed to introduce psychiatrists and other mental health professionals to gender-affirmative mental health care, grounded in research evidence and best clinical practices. Presentations are given by expert faculty specialized in transgender-focused research and patient care. The meeting is appropriate for all members of health care teams, including physicians, psychologists, behavioral health care providers, physician assistants, nurses, social workers, and other staff, school workers, and parents.

Upon conclusion of this program, participants should be able to:

- 1. Discuss adolescent and emerging adults' development with gender perspective
- 2. Discuss how patient centered, developmental paradigms to gender might reduce bias and stigma that create disparities and lead to risks

- 9. Describe how gender dysphoria that persists through the onset of puberty or is increased at the onset of puberty is unlikely to subside

The Brune-Reutlinger Mansion in San Francisco's historic Alamo Square district was designed in 1886 by noted local architect Heinrich Geilfuss for whiskey baron Henry Brune. When Richard Reutlinger bought the mansion in 1965 it was structurally sound but had become drab and dilapidated from neglect after World War II. Richard's home displays not only his antique furniture but also his collection of automated music machines - player pianos, nickelodeons and orchestrions - for your amazement and amusement. Reutlinger is a longtime member of Victorian Society in America. The California Heritage Council has recognized Richard Reutlinger "for restoration and preservation of his Victorian, circa 1886, Italianate style home at 824 Grove Street, San Francisco."
